I shall soon lodge the necessary application through my bank.

I enclose herewith the breakdown of the above expenses. The relevant receipts are available and will be despatched to you if you so request.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank, through you, the IAU for the generous financial support it gave to the first ISYA ever to be held in Africa. My only regret is that we overshot the designated subvention somewhat.

I shall in due course send you a comprehensive report of the Nigerian ISYA.

Preliminary report on the 9th International School for Young Astronomers, 1978 (University of Nigeria, Nsukka; from 31.7 to 19.8).

Subject: General astronomy and astrophysics with intense practical training(Spherical astronomy - 5 hrs; Planetary system - 5 hrs; Solar physics - 10 hrs; Solar energy utilization- 10 hrs; Stars and galaxies - 15 hrs; Structure and evolution of the universe - 15 hrs; Practical astronomy - 28 hrs; Seminars and General discussions - 14 hrs).

Lecturers: Dr. D.Fubara, Dr.J.Kleczek, Dr.S.Okoye, Dr.G.Swarup, Dr.H.Hubenet, Dr.C.McGruder, Dr.E. Schmitter.

Participants: 28 physicists (lecturers and professors) from Kenya, Ghana, Tanzania, Nigeria.

Purpose: Introduce astronomy into Black Africa - both as science and as a teaching subject in schools.

According to a general opinion , the School fulfilled its purpose:

- a) Department of Astronomy (the first in Black Africa) has been formed at the University of Nsukka, headed by Professor Sam Okoye, Regular courses of Astronomy will start this autumn.
- b) Possibilities of an equatorial radiotelescope (a common project of several countries) have been discussed.
- c) Cooperation between different African universities discussed.
- d) Future trends of astronomy development in Black Africa have been the subject of General discussion at which participated all the lecturers and all the participants.
- 4) Many individual problems have been settled during meals, breaks and excursions. Most of the time, lecturers and participants were together.

- f), The participants have learnt much and with ease (being physicists), most of them became very interrested in astronomy and they have appreciated the epportunity to participate at the School
- g) I would like to recommend four participants as Corresponding members of our Commission 46 (from Tanzania, Ghana, Kenya and Nigeria).
- h) Thanks to the full support from the Utrecht Observatory and before all thanks to Dr. Hans Hubenet, Practical Training became the most important part of the School. Dr. Hubenet was assisted by Dr. E. Ambah Schmitter (from Mexico at present teaching at Lagos University) and by Dr. C. McGruder (from Philadelphia at present teaching at Nsukka). Kleczek lead 4 hours of Practical Training.
- i) Many films were projected and commented.
- j) This was the most busy School we have had untill now. The program was very crowded and exhausting for participants and lecturers as well. But it was excellently organized by the School President Professor S.Okoye. According to the epinion of lecturers and participants it was wortwhile.
